#### □ **New Member Recruitment**

Luigi Ferrer introduced the new two-page committee application and the new mentorship process, developed by the Community Coalition Roundtable. Mr. Ferrer stressed the legislative and practical importance of including people with HIV, specifically Ryan White clients, as members of every committee.

## VIII. Standing Business

### ▪ **Miami-Dade County HIV Prevention Workgroups – Updates and Calls to Action!**

Prevention Workgroup leaders reviewed the shared synopsis of their group's activities and calls to action.

## ▪ 2027-2031 Integrated Plan Development

Staff demonstrated the new Monitoring and Reporting System (MRS) database and reminded members of the timeline for completion of the Integrated Plan. It was noted that all measurements must have a data source to be included in the database.

Members continued review of Goal 1: Prevent New HIV Transmission, which was updated considerably since the last meeting to include contract reporting requirements of the Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County (FDOH-MDC). Additionally, the MRS database is no longer tracking step-by-step, administrative functions supporting the objectives and requires all measurements to have a data source.

It is likely a workgroup will be formed to finalize Targets and Baselines, and to identify additional Key Partners, and Funding Sources. Staff reminded members of the restrictions on meetings to comply with Government in the Sunshine Laws.

The following comments and updates were discussed:

- Objective 1.1: Increase knowledge of HIV status to 95% by ensuring all people with HIV receive a diagnosis as early as possible.
  - Case matching is ongoing from the preliminary FDOH Surveillance report on HIV status to confirmatory status and taking into account other databases; therefore, reported numbers are subject to change.
  - Adult cases can also be tracked using the FDOH database: Counseling Testing Linkage Services (CTLS).
  - Data on new cases as reported by doctors may also be available.
  - The Uniform Data System (UDS) database used by Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHC) can provide the number of annual HIV tests conducted.
  - Kira Villamizar will follow up with FDOH to determine if CTLS can create unique IDs; and what data we can expect from Surveillance considering limited resources.
  - Collection of comprehensive data is challenging since the different database systems are not connected.
- Measurement 1.1.2.3: Number of HIV positive people identified at non-healthcare community settings via *rapid* testing
  - Change to, “. . . *preliminary* testing.”
  - Note that most testing is rapid testing; however, preliminary testing is all-encompassing.
  - Staff will request confirmation of the language as reported in CTLS.
- Measurement 1.1.2.4: Number of newly diagnosed HIV positive identified at non-healthcare community settings
  - Confirm with Surveillance if this data is available; if not, the measurement will be deleted.
- Measurement 1.1.2.5: Number of HIV self-test kits distributed. [or Number of people who received a self-test kit]
  - Ask partners such as Care Resource to provide distribution numbers.
  - Identify additional partners.

- Measurement 1.1.3.1: Number of healthcare facilities conducting HIV screening for STIs and HCV
  - Change to, “Number of healthcare facilities conducting screening for *HIV, STIs, and HCV.*”
  - Add FQHCs to Key Partners.
  - Add Monitoring UDS to Data Source.
- Measurement 1.1.3.2: Number of HIV tests conducted in conjunction with an HCV test within healthcare facilities
  - Add FQHCs to Key Partners.
  - Add UDS to Monitoring Data Source.
- Measurement 1.1.3.4: Number of HCV tests conducted at non-healthcare settings in conjunction with HIV testing
  - Change to, “. . . in conjunction with *rapid or confirmatory* HIV testing.”
  - Remove “Holding” status.
- Measurement 1.1.3.5: Number of people with a positive HCV test identified through integrated screening at non-healthcare facilities
  - Remove “Holding” status.
  - Add MOAs, FQHCs, Hospitals, and Private Practices with MOAs, to Key Partners.
  - Add UDS to Monitoring Data Source.
- Measurement 1.1.3.6: Number of HIV tests conducted in conjunction with a Syphilis test within healthcare facilities
  - Add Ob/Gyns and FQHCs, to Key Partners.
- Objective 1.2: Implement a comprehensive approach to treat people with diagnosed HIV, rapidly and effectively, to achieve viral suppression, (increase linkage to care to 95%; and increase viral suppression to 95%).
  - Move Objective 1.2 to Goal 2.
- Measurement 1.3.1.4: Number of clients with ongoing risk of HIV acquisition referred to PEP and PrEP services
  - Measurement was rewritten to remove the reference to “refer population”.
  - Add PrEP referral platform to Key Partners.
- Measurement 1.3.1.5: Estimated percentage (or number) of people who are prescribed PrEP (PREP coverage)
  - Add “Pharma” – ViiV and Gilead to Monitoring Data Source.
- Add Measurement 1.3.1.6: Estimated percentage (or number) of PrEP *prescriptions written*
  - Add “Pharma” – ViiV and Gilead to Monitoring Data Source.

- Measurement 1.3.1.7: Monitor PrEP to Need ratio in MDC
  - Note: Based on incidence; and question: can we capture nPEP?
  - Add University of California of San Diego, AIDSvu, AHEAD Dashboard to Monitoring Data Source.
- Activity 1.3.3: Support services at IDEA Exchange , and whole-person approach to HIV prevention services
  - The wording of the Activity should indicate IDEA Exchange because that is the only syringe services program in the county.
  - Measurements may include number of referrals and number of educational events.
  - Ms. Villamizar will coordinate with Dr. David Forrest to develop one or two measurements.
- Measurement 1.3.4.1: Number of educational sessions conducted with providers and hospitals promoting routine HIV testing of all pregnant persons and diagnostic HIV testing for HIV-exposed infants
  - Change to, “Number of educational sessions conducted *virtually and in person* . . .
  - Add University of Miami-Perinatal HIV Program to Key Partners.
- Measurement 1.3.4.2: Number of educational sessions conducted with providers and hospitals to promote awareness and responsibility of utilizing the High-Risk Pregnancy Notification and Newborn Exposure Notification forms
  - Change to, “Number of educational sessions conducted *virtually and in person* . . .”
  - Add University of Miami-Perinatal HIV Program to Key Partners.
- Activity 1.3.4: Conduct perinatal, maternal, and infant health prevention and surveillance activities and support maintaining the national goals of perinatal HIV incidence of < 1 per 100,000 live births and a perinatal transmission rate of < 1 %
  - Add Measurements:
    - 1.3.4.7: Number of infants born to mothers who are HIV positive
    - 1.3.4.8: Number of infants exposed to HIV from their HIV positive mother
    - 1.3.4.9: Number of infants who contracted HIV from their HIV positive mother

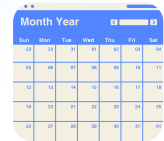

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## Report on Integrated Plan Development Prevention Survey Results Presented April 30, 2026

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### Introduction

A brief survey was developed to gain community insights into HIV prevention needs, challenges, and successful strategies in Miami-Dade County. The results will be considered in the development of the *2027-2031 Integrated HIV Prevention and Care Plan for Miami-Dade County*, specifically, goal setting, situational analysis, and community feedback.

The survey was programmed in Survey Monkey, with a link and QR code posted throughout the [www.PartnershipMiami.org](http://www.PartnershipMiami.org) website, sent to the Partnership’s listserv of more than 1,300 members, and promoted through social media.

The survey was live from March 3 through March 20, 2026.

### Respondents

Respondents were required to live and/or work in Miami-Dade County.

Respondents had the choice to complete the survey in English or Spanish. Sixty-three people responded to the English language version; and 15 people responded to the Spanish language version.

Respondents were asked to identify their area of interest:

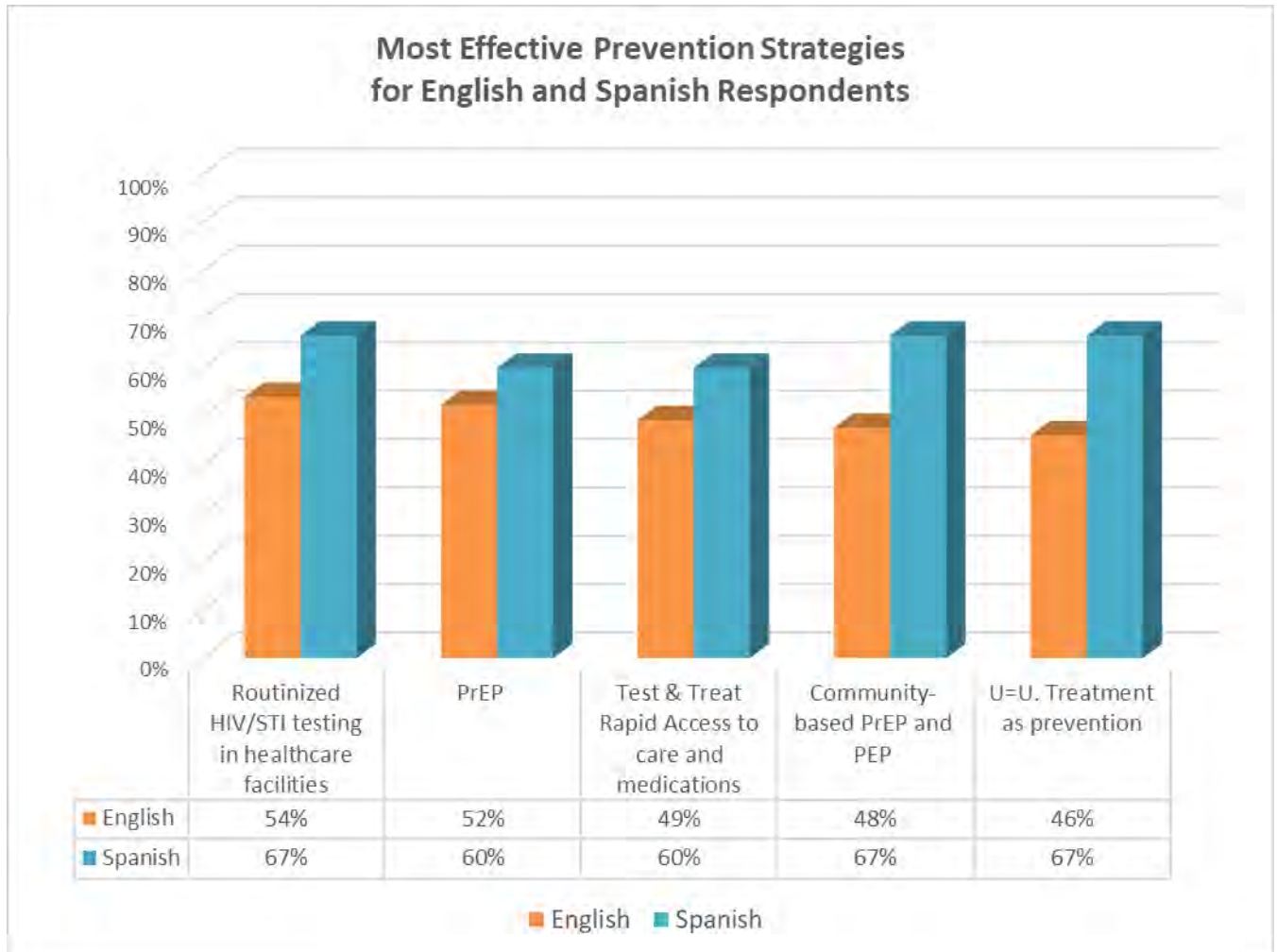

The top choices are indicated in the tables below. Where the top choices differed between English and Spanish, the top choices for both languages are included.

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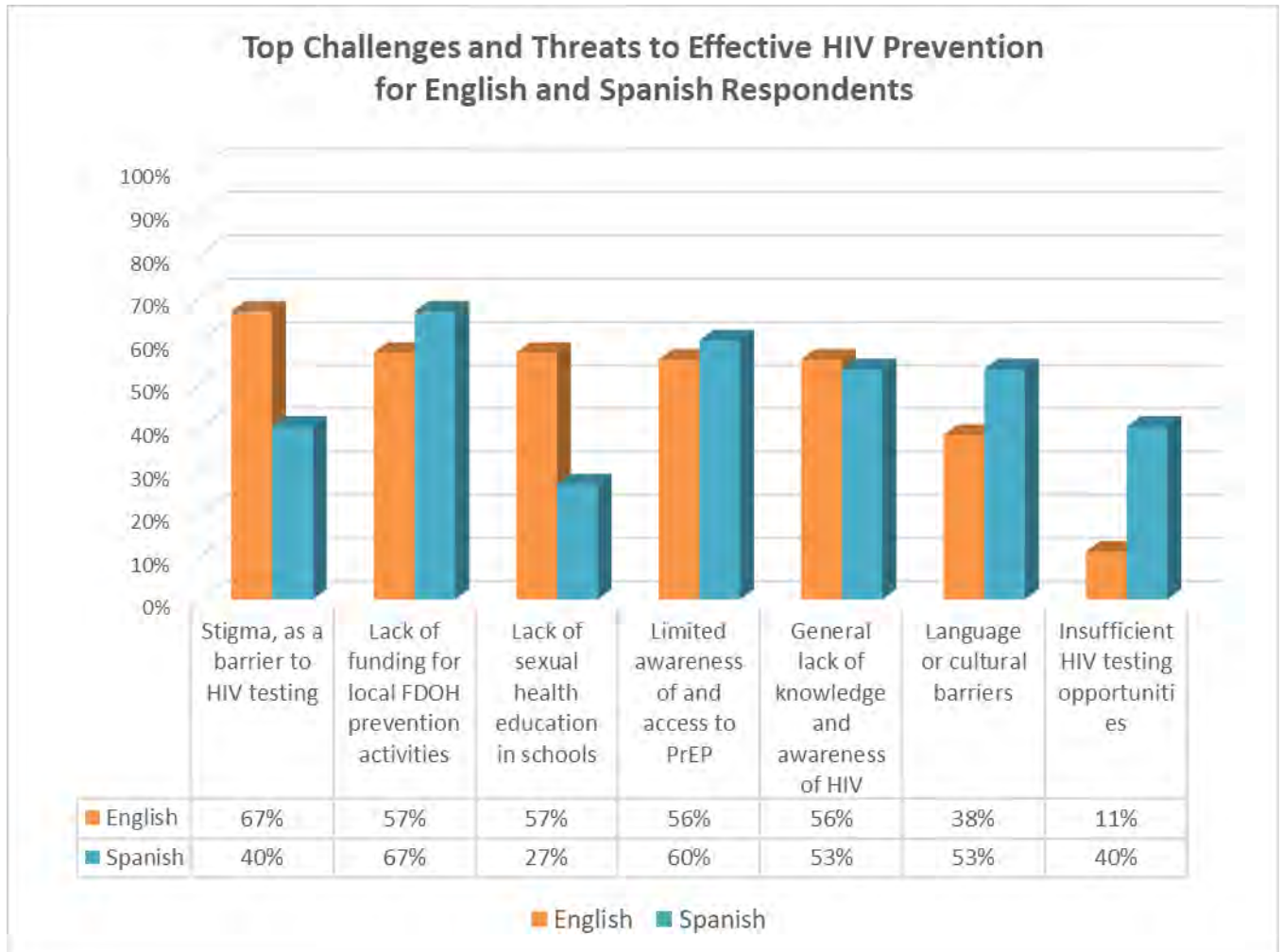
1. These are the current HIV prevention strategies for reducing new HIV transmission in Miami-Dade County. Which are the five most effective strategies?

  - Culturally sensitive outreach

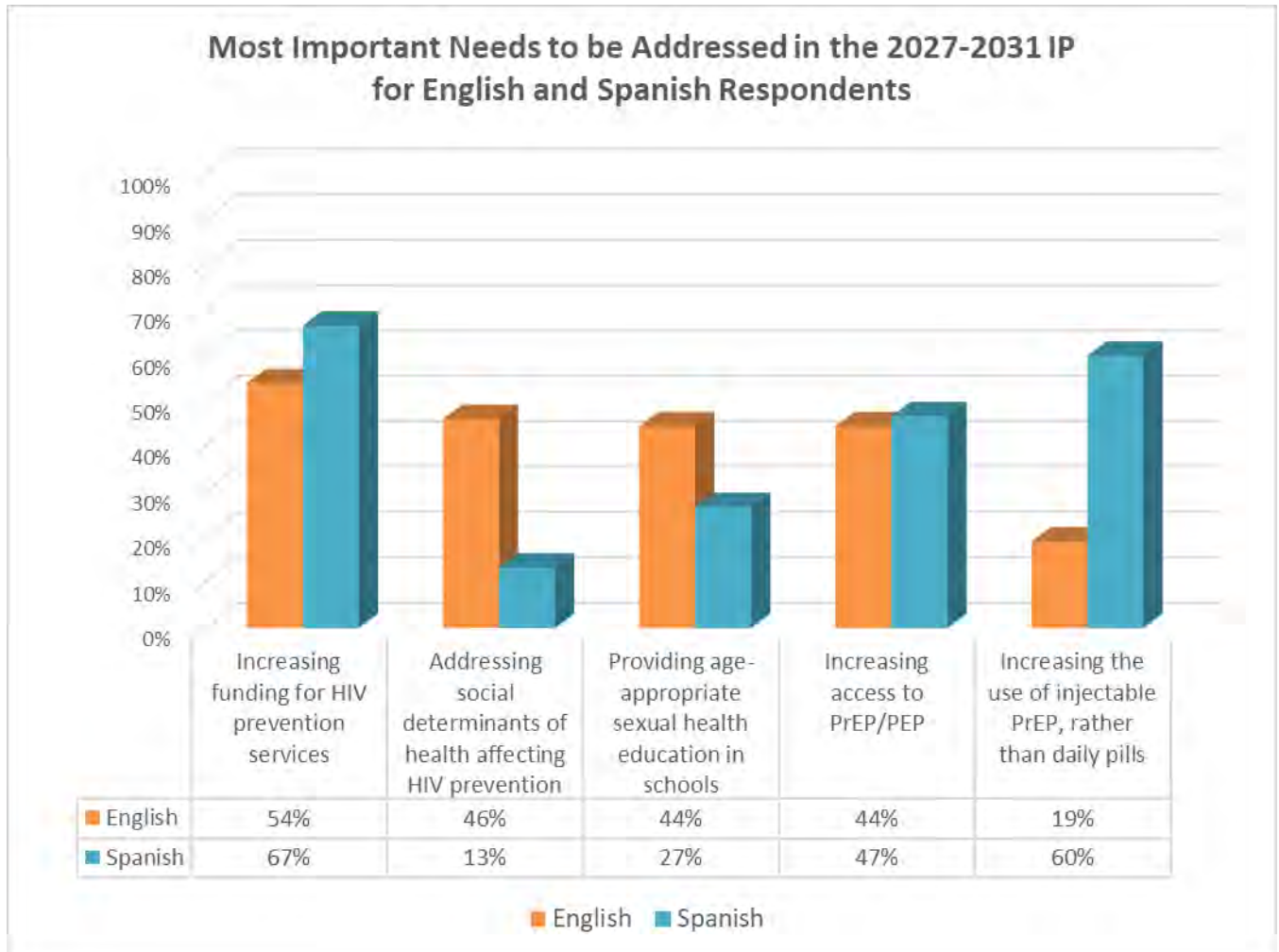
2. What are the top five challenges and threats to effective HIV prevention in Miami-Dade County?



Lower Ranked Challenges (in order of English ranking)

- Stigma, as a barrier to PrEP
- Insufficient outreach to engage people in underserved or high-incidence locations
- Lack of transportation or other geographical barriers
- Bias against PrEP among health care providers
- Lack of access to digital or mobile devices and social media messaging
- Other
  - Teaching gay men that unprotected sex is very risky.
  - Insufficient HIV testing in private sector and urgent care.

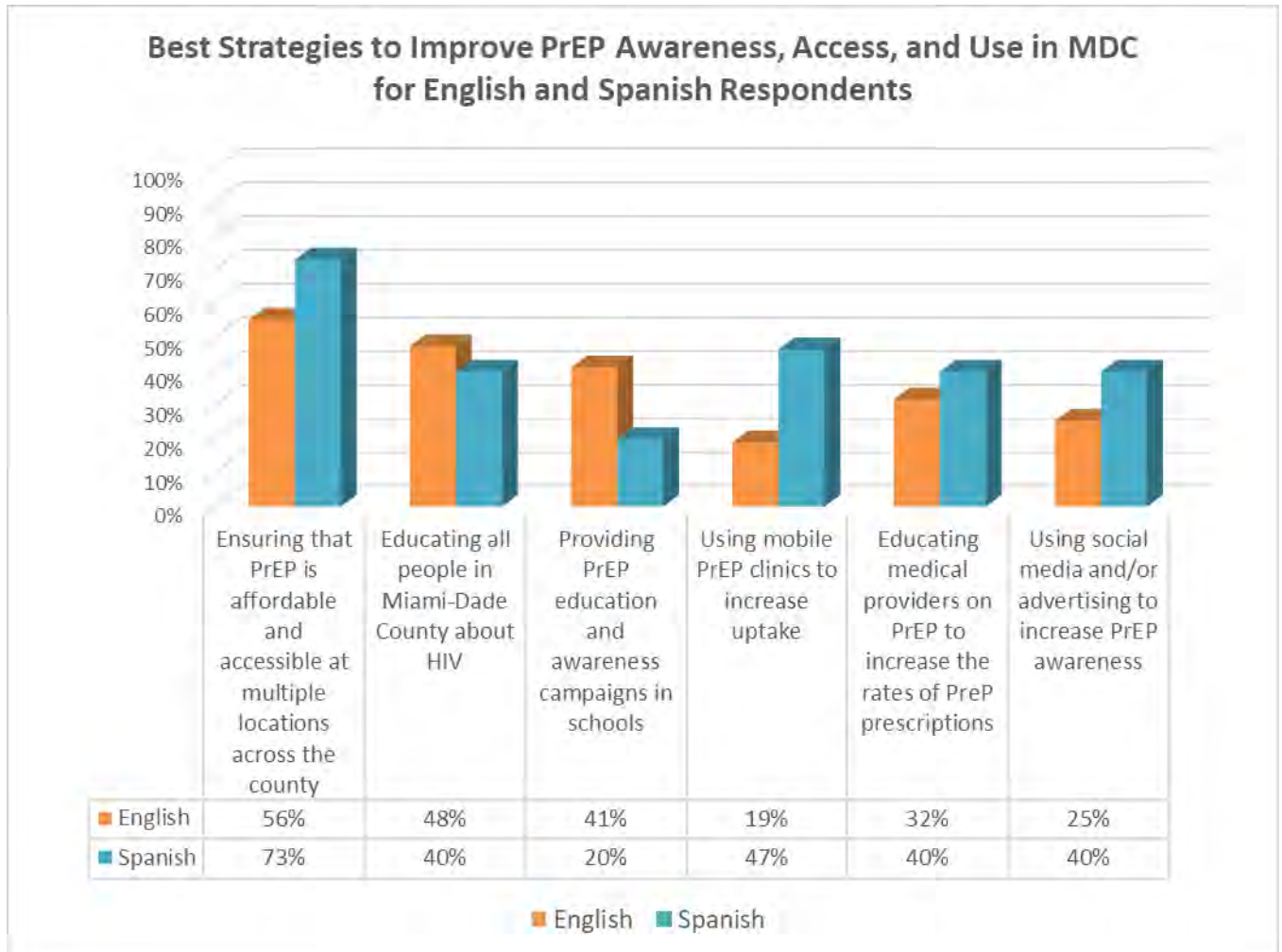
3. What are the three most important HIV prevention needs to be addressed in the 2027–2031 HIV Prevention and Care Integrated Plan for Miami-Dade County?



Lower Ranked Needs (in order of English ranking)

- Reducing stigma through community and faith-based engagement
- Expanding mobile HIV/STI testing in underserved and high-incidence areas
- Strengthening youth-based social media outreach
- Other
  - Subcontracting the funds to grassroots organizations that are in the community without funding, A Leap of Faith Foundation.
  - Increase HIV/STD education and testing in private medical offices and urgent care.

4. What are the three best strategies to improve PrEP awareness, access, and use in Miami-Dade County?



Lower Ranked Needs (in order of English ranking)

- Providing culturally and linguistically appropriate educational materials that are easy to understand
- Using peer educators to reach underserved, hard-to-reach populations
- Other
  - Using all funding sources to meet the financial strains currently in this political climate.
  - Paying for the medical visits.
  - Giving Emergency Departments the opportunity or access to prescribe PrEP.

#### **STRENGTHS**

- More than 35 years of service delivery experience by service providers funded through the Miami-Dade County Office of Management and Budget Grants Coordination/Ryan White Program – the Ryan White Program Part A/Minority AIDS Initiative Recipient (the Recipient); and the Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County – the prevention funding grantee (FDOH-MDC).
- Active involvement and dedication of various stakeholders engaged in needs assessment; client satisfaction surveys; prevention, care, and treatment planning; and priority setting and resource allocation activities.
- Recipients and subrecipients are in ongoing daily communication to help ensure quality services are provided to people with HIV.
- An array of available ART medications - oral medications and a long-acting injectables are available.
- The Recipients, FDOH-MDC, and the Partnership maintain comprehensive websites and/or social media accounts which provide resources for people with HIV, service providers and the general public.

#### **CHALLENGES**

- Pending funding cuts and program changes to ADAP and ACA premium coverage.
- Not enough messaging about PrEP and nPEP that effectively reaches the intended audiences.
- Not enough “People First” messaging and service delivery.
- Not enough relevant or engaging prevention, care and treatment messaging that looks like the community that we are trying to serve.
- Inability to adequately measure or address stigma.
- Need to provide more education regarding health insurance, navigating the health care system, mitigating feelings of mistrust with the medical system, and how to effectively use insurance benefits.

- Aging workforce – succession planning must be prioritized.
- Treatment fatigue for clients.
- Service delivery and administrative fatigue for service providers, subrecipients, and recipients.
- Maintaining a focus on healthcare amid stigma issues, socio-economic factors, and social determinants of health, especially in underserved populations.
- Legislation disenfranchising vulnerable populations.
- Legislation and funding not keeping pace with changes in client needs and the changing healthcare landscape.
- Funding cuts to HIV research.
- Major cuts to prevention funding impacting service availability, condom distribution, payments for PrEP, lost testing sites, and lost workforce; relevant to HIV and STD prevention.
- Cuts to Ryan White Program funding based on the new HRSA Formula Award calculation – based on most recent client address not the address at time of diagnosis.
- Lack of sex education, lack of ability to provide sexual health materials in schools, and lack of ability for HIV and STI testing in schools.
- Stigma, isolation, and chronic conditions specific to people aging with HIV.
- Cost of insurance, with or without ADAP premium assistance, and increases in sliding scale payments.

#### **IDENTIFIED NEEDS**

- Transitional housing, short-term housing, or emergency housing assistance to prevent homelessness.
- Help to pay private insurance (employer-sponsored, ACA, etc.) costs (premiums, copays, deductibles).
- Oral health care (dental care, dentures, oral surgery, implants for edentulous clients, etc.)
- Limited, one-time or short-term assistance with any of the following: medications not covered by AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP), utilities, housing, food, or transportation.
- Food (food bank services, grocery certificates, home-delivered meals, or nutritional supplements).
- Access to resources in multiple languages.
- Address the specific needs of groups that may face barriers to care, including younger individuals and people aging into Medicare, particularly regarding issues such as stigma and access to services.
- Need to leverage the knowledge of subject matter experts across the HIV Care Continuum.
- In home services such as labs and medication delivery, particularly for the aging population and those with limited mobility.
- Funding may not be sufficient to address all the needs identified in this Plan.



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
