



Report on Integrated Plan Development Prevention Survey Results Presented April 30, 2026

Introduction

A brief survey was developed to gain community insights into HIV prevention needs, challenges, and successful strategies in Miami-Dade County. The results will be considered in the development of the *2027-2031 Integrated HIV Prevention and Care Plan for Miami-Dade County*, specifically, goal setting, situational analysis, and community feedback.

The survey was programmed in Survey Monkey, with a link and QR code posted throughout the www.PartnershipMiami.org website, sent to the Partnership's listserv of more than 1,300 members, and promoted through social media.

The survey was live from March 3 through March 20, 2026.

Respondents

Respondents were required to live and/or work in Miami-Dade County.

Respondents had the choice to complete the survey in English or Spanish. Sixty-three people responded to the English language version; and 15 people responded to the Spanish language version.

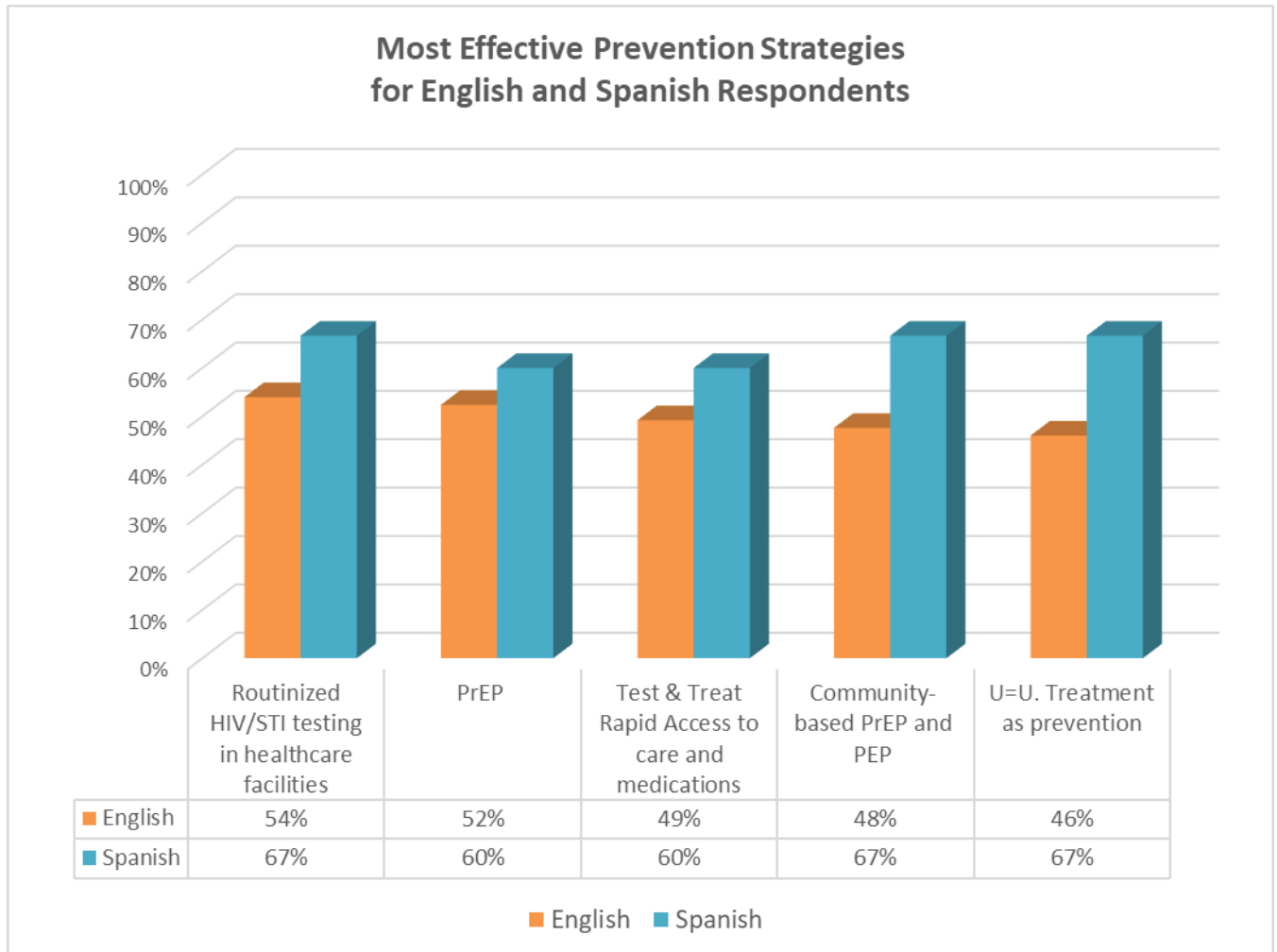
Respondents were asked to identify their area of interest:

The top choices are indicated in the tables below. Where the top choices differed between English and Spanish, the top choices for both languages are included.

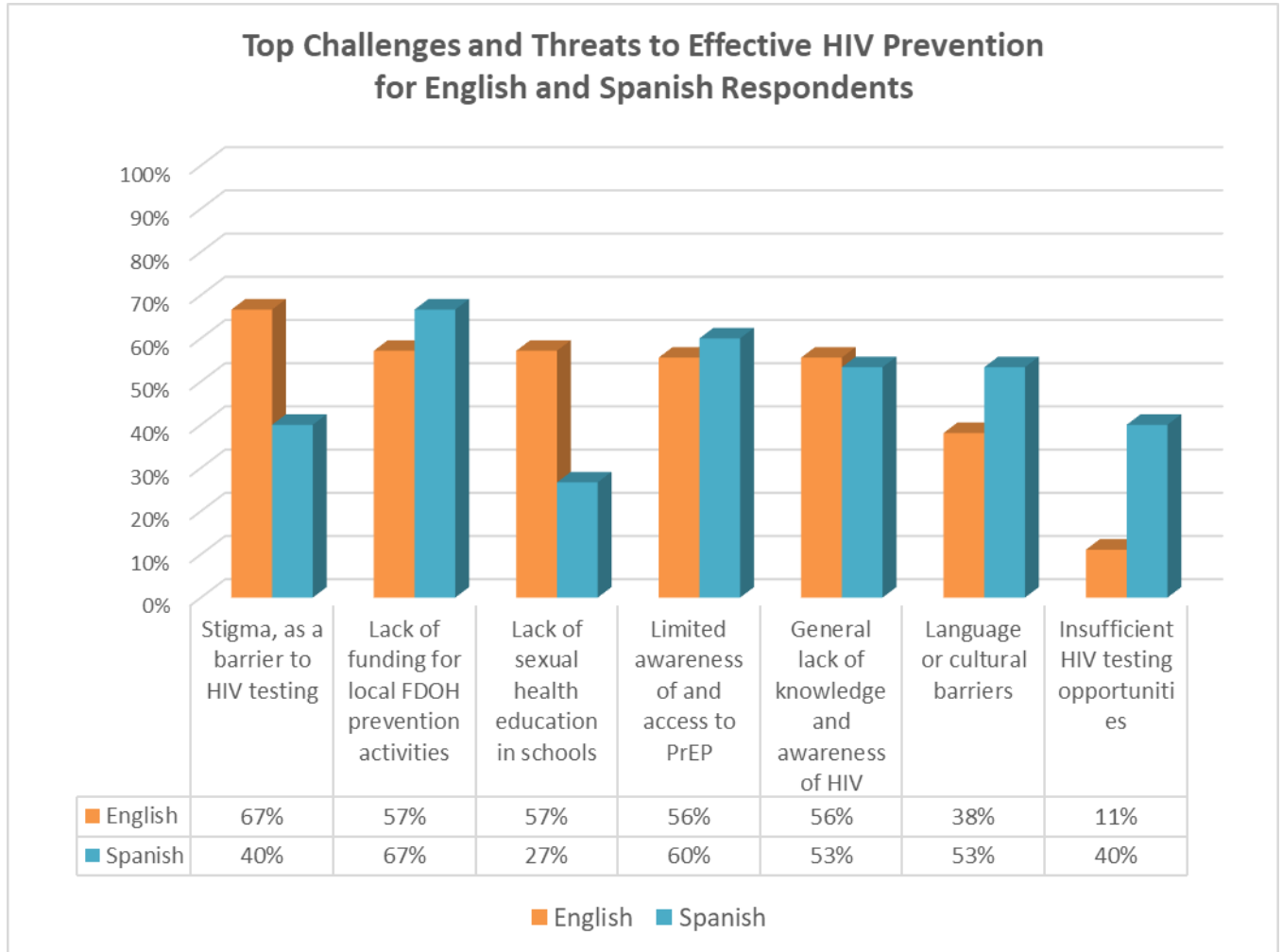
1. These are the current HIV prevention strategies for reducing new HIV transmission in Miami-Dade County. Which are the five most effective strategies?



Lower Ranked Strategies (in order of English ranking)

- Community-based HIV prevention providers
- Free condoms
- Culturally tailored education
- Priority testing in high-incidence neighborhoods
- Outreach efforts
- HIV prevention support groups
- HIV home test kits
- Other
 - Harm Reduction services
 - Culturally sensitive outreach

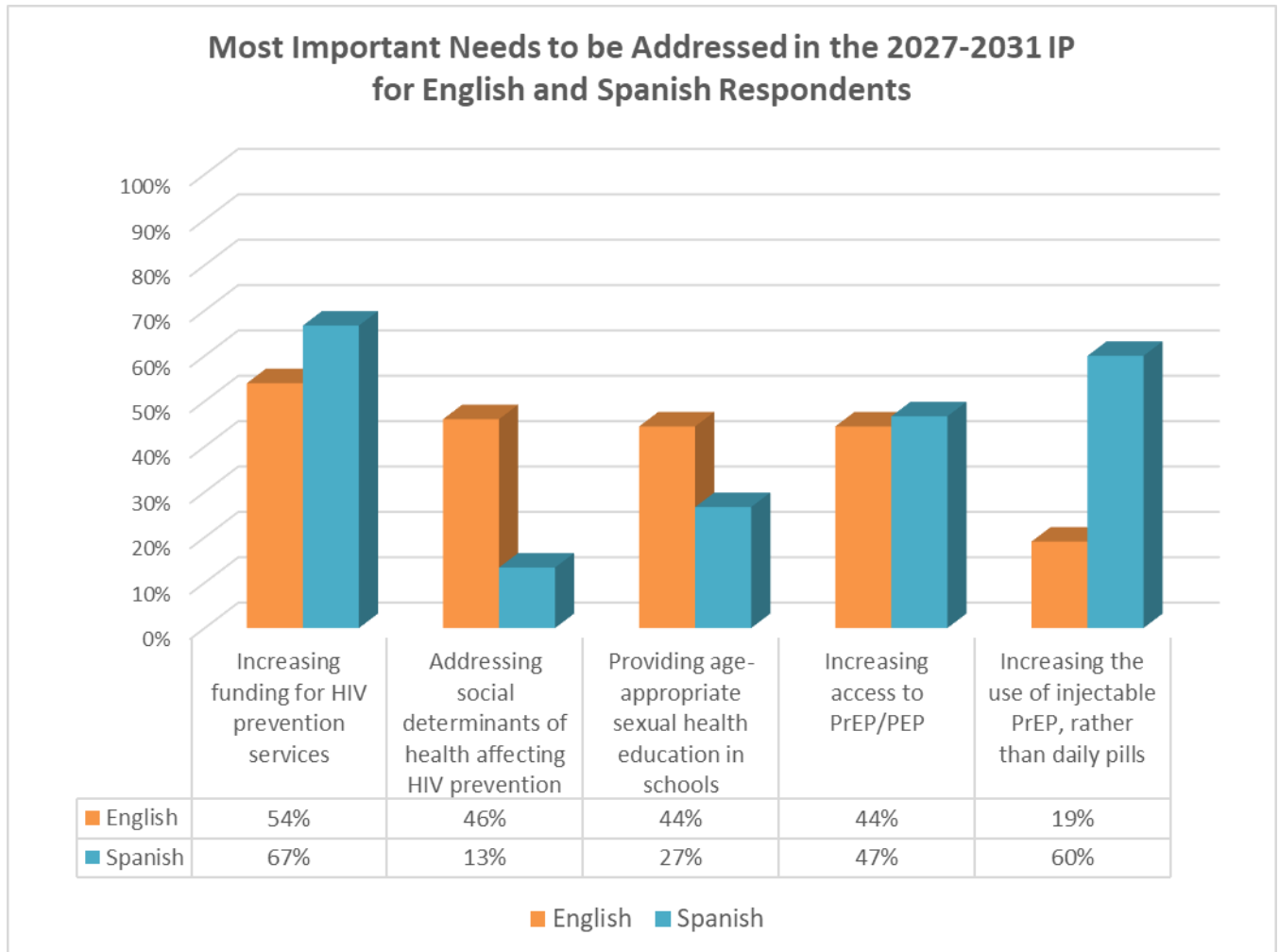
2. What are the top five challenges and threats to effective HIV prevention in Miami-Dade County?



Lower Ranked Challenges (in order of English ranking)

- Stigma, as a barrier to PrEP
- Insufficient outreach to engage people in underserved or high-incidence locations
- Lack of transportation or other geographical barriers
- Bias against PrEP among health care providers
- Lack of access to digital or mobile devices and social media messaging
- Other
 - Teaching gay men that unprotected sex is very risky.
 - Insufficient HIV testing in private sector and urgent care.

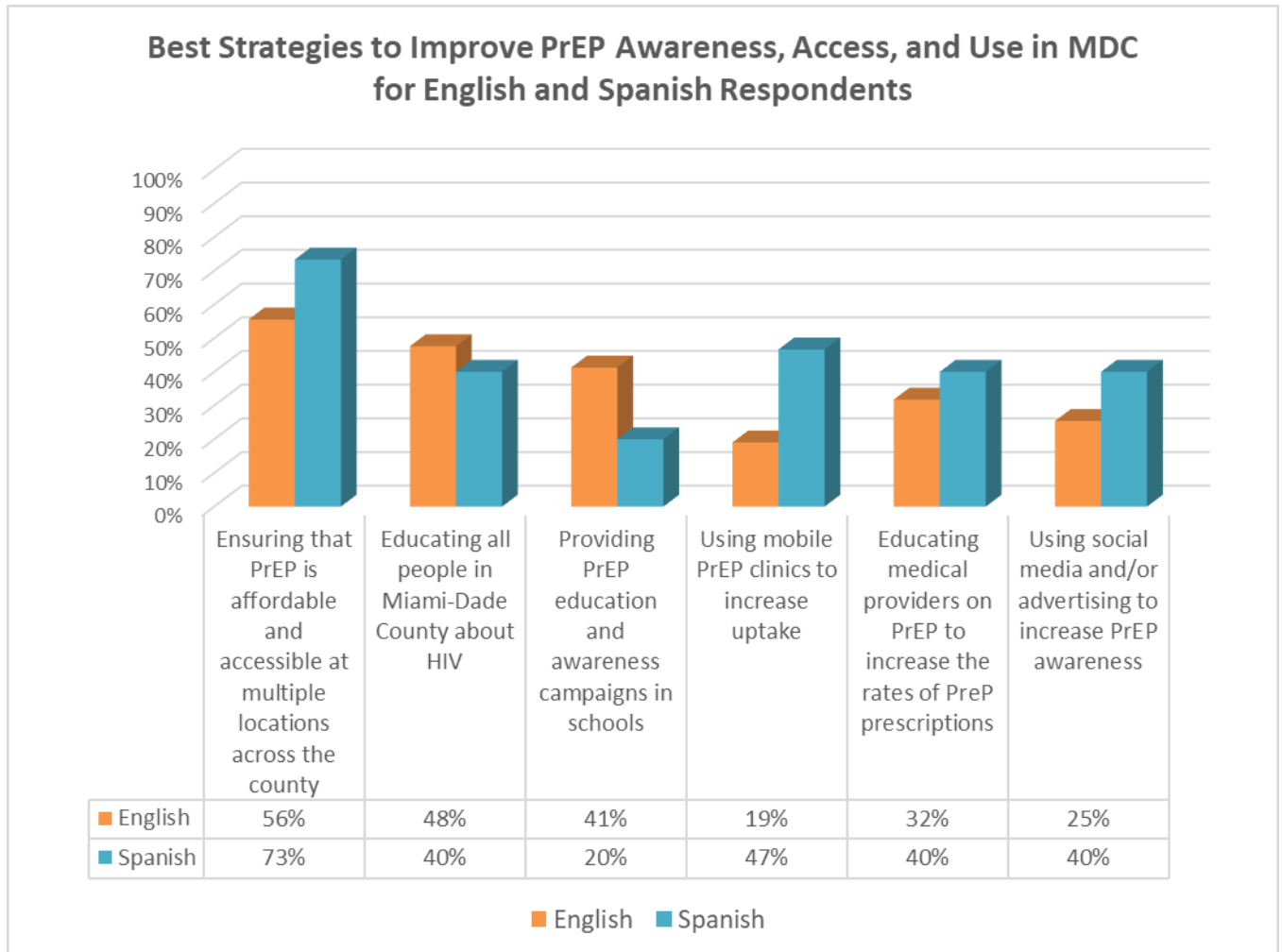
3. What are the three most important HIV prevention needs to be addressed in the 2027–2031 HIV Prevention and Care Integrated Plan for Miami-Dade County?



Lower Ranked Needs (in order of English ranking)

- Reducing stigma through community and faith-based engagement
- Expanding mobile HIV/STI testing in underserved and high-incidence areas
- Strengthening youth-based social media outreach
- Other
 - Subcontracting the funds to grassroot organizations that are in the community without funding, A Leap of Faith Foundation.
 - Increase HIV/STD education and testing in private medical offices and urgent care.

4. What are the three best strategies to improve PrEP awareness, access, and use in Miami-Dade County?



Lower Ranked Needs (in order of English ranking)

- Providing culturally and linguistically appropriate educational materials that are easy to understand
- Using peer educators to reach underserved, hard-to-reach populations
- Other
 - Using all funding sources to meet the financial strains currently in this political climate.
 - Paying for the medical visits.
 - Giving Emergency Departments the opportunity or access to prescribe PrEP.
