

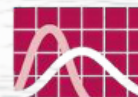

Notes

- All data in this report are subject to change and revision.
- FY refers to the Ryan White Program Fiscal Year (FY 2025 is March 1, 2025 - February 28, 2026; FY 2024 is March 1, 2024 - February 28, 2025; etc.).
- CY refers to the calendar year (January 1 - December 31).
- HRSA is the Health Services and Resources Administration, the federal funder of the Ryan White Program.
- HRSA HIV Care Continuum Definitions:
 - In Medical Care: At least one medical visit, a CD4 test, or viral load test in a 12-month period.
 - Retained In Medical Care: Two or more medical visits or viral load tests, at least 90 days apart in a 12-month period.
 - Viral Load (VL) Suppression is based on data for people with HIV who had at least one outpatient ambulatory health services visit and at least one viral load test during the measurement year and whose most recent viral load test result was less than 200 copies/mL.

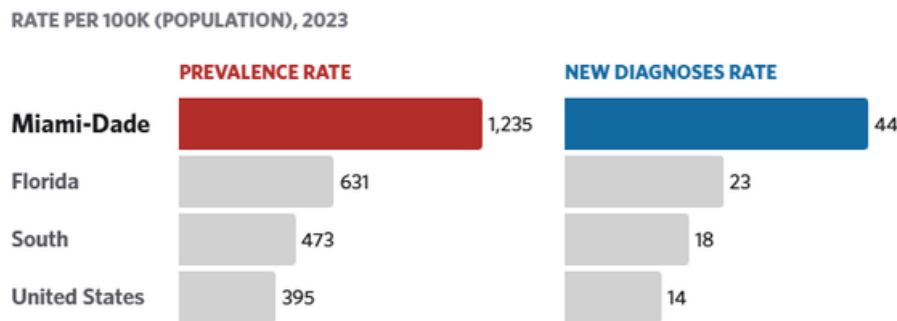

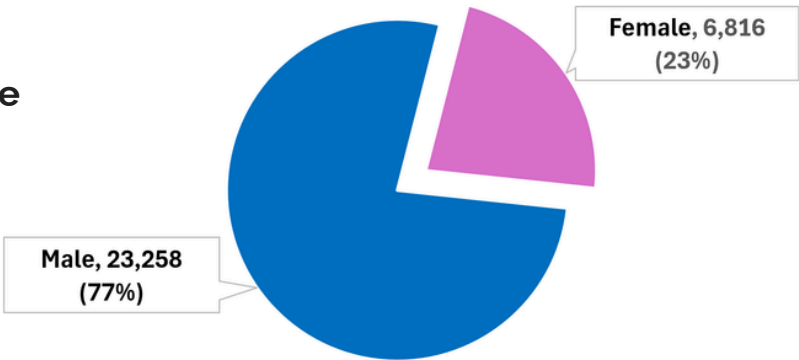

Geographic Distribution

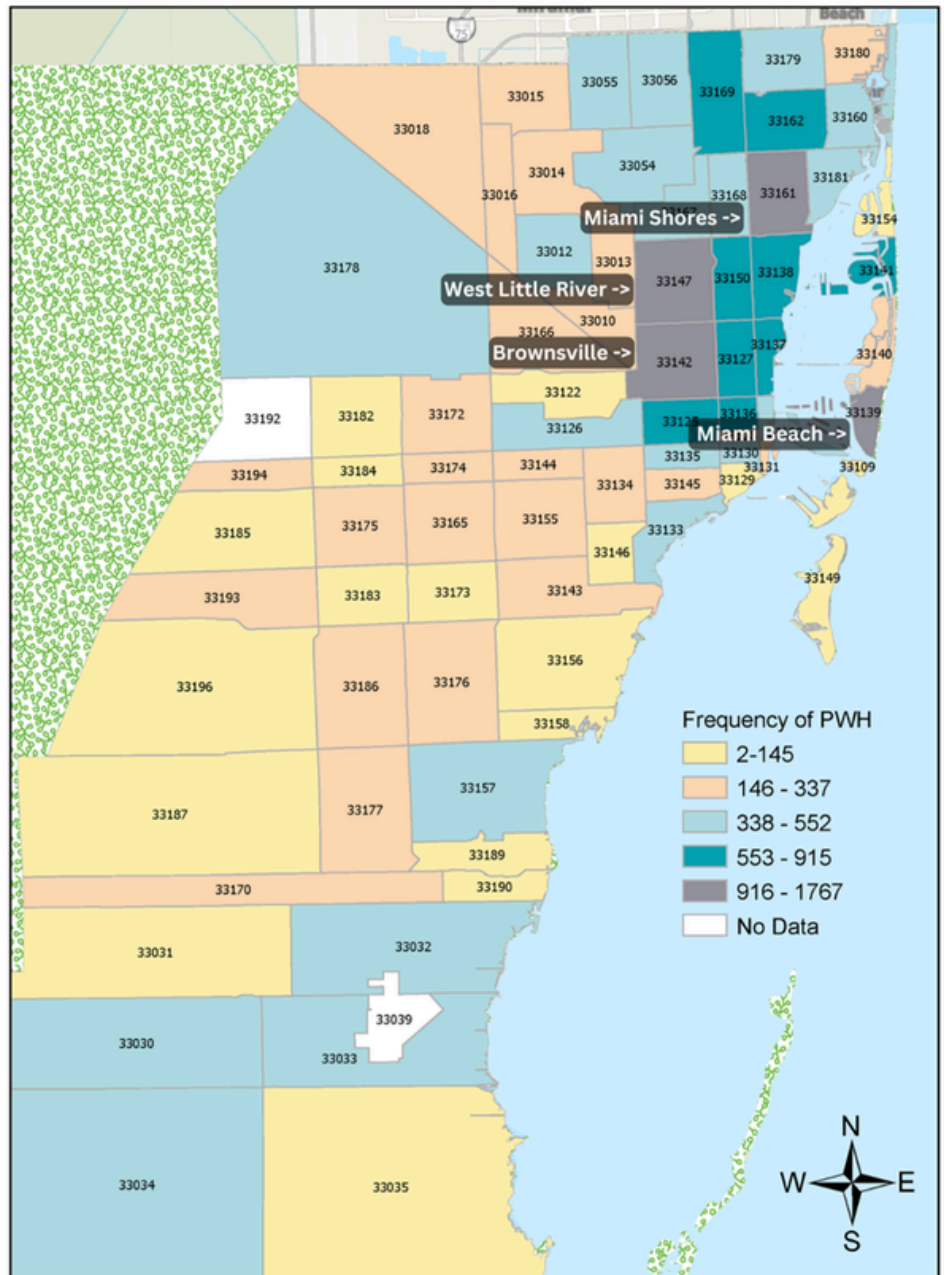
Miami-Dade County occupies **4%** of the total area of the State of Florida and supports 12% of Florida's population, yet it accounts for almost **23%** of the total number of people with HIV in the state. Of all people with HIV in the county, the areas of highest concentration are highlighted below. Data are used to direct services to areas of greatest need.

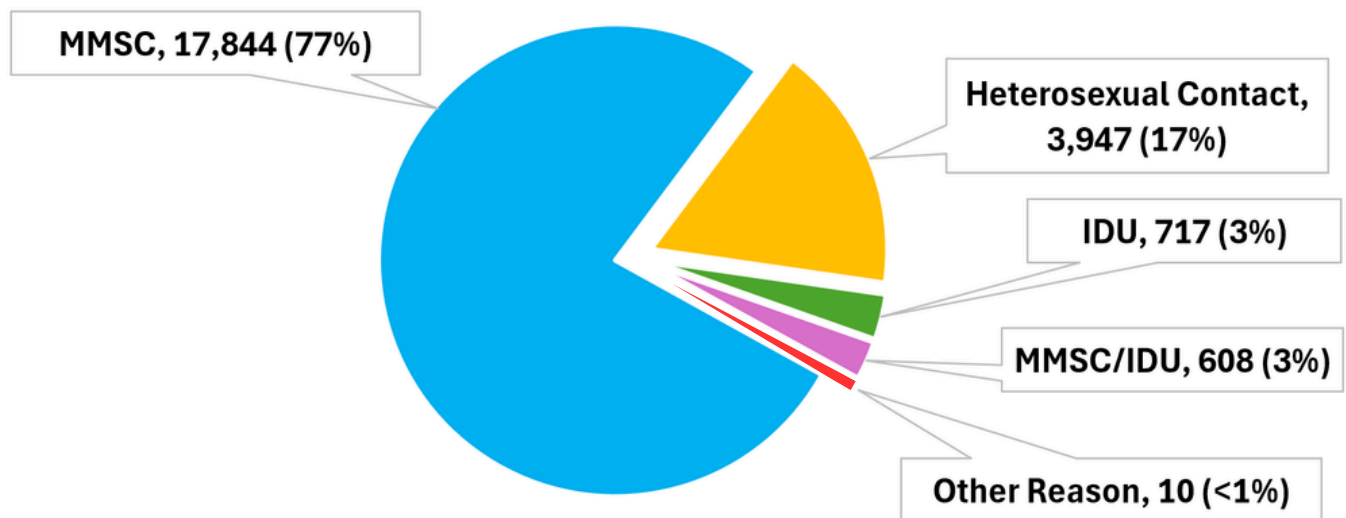
HIV Transmission

In 2024, the Florida Department of Health reported the following modes of acquiring HIV among people in Miami-Dade County.

- The 2025 FDOH Epidemiological Profile includes data through CY 2024; the most recent data available.
- Modes of transmission are self-reported. Pediatric transmission is not included: n=299.
- Other Reason includes reason not reported or identified, including hemophilia, blood transfusion, perinatal exposure, or missing/suppressed data.
- IDU: Intravenous Drug Use.
- MMSC: Male-to-Male Sexual Contact.

Groups Experiencing Higher HIV Impact

People Over 50 with HIV and Long-Term Survivors

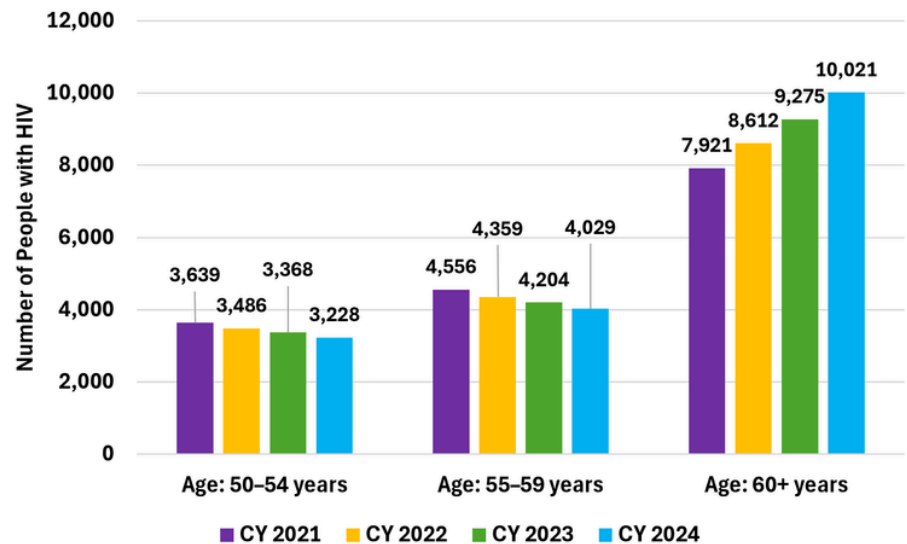
The trend is clear: People with HIV are aging out of their 50s and living into their 60s and 70s.

This is a population of special concern because people with HIV over 50 and long-term survivors (living with HIV for 20 or more years) are more likely to have negative health outcomes due to cognitive impairment, diabetes, hypertension, and other co-occurring conditions.

More than **74%** of people with HIV in Miami-Dade County are Age 50 or older, and more than **33%** are over age 60.

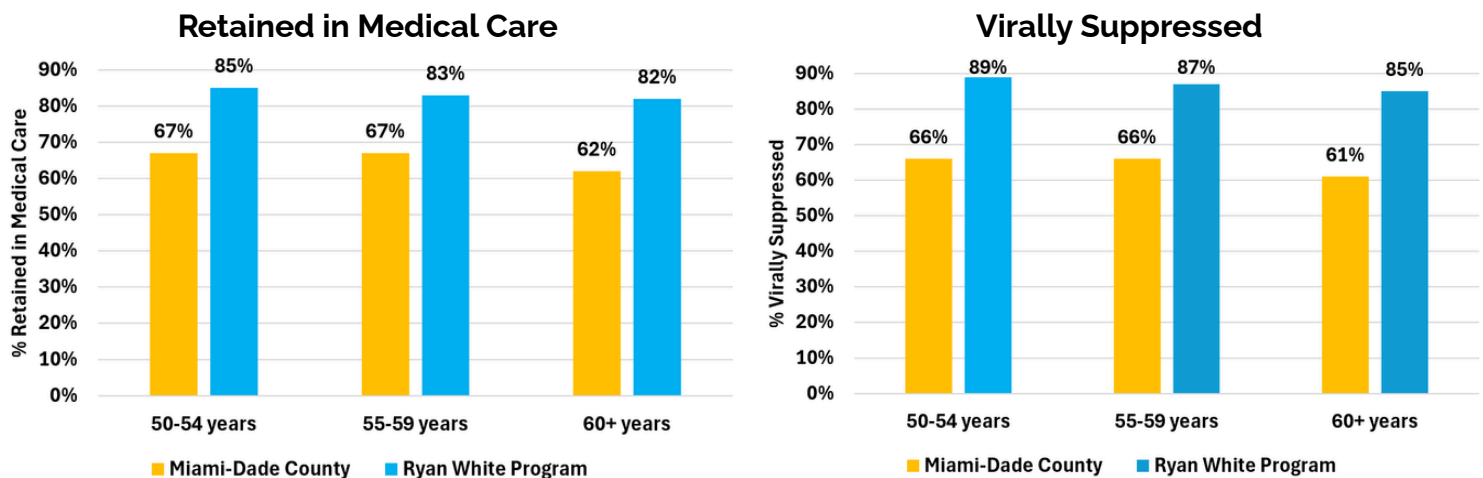


Positive Health Outcomes

The Ryan White Program (RWP) in Miami-Dade County continues to excel in keeping people in medical care and maintaining viral suppression - two of the most important measurements contributing to positive health outcomes. People with HIV in the 50 years and older age groups continue to show better health outcomes than the overall county population of people with HIV.

Social Determinants of Health

For people with HIV, the challenges of living in poverty, experiencing unstable housing or homelessness, and struggling to access or afford food make maintaining effective HIV treatment especially complicated.

People Living in Poverty

According to the 2024 Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (US Census, 2024), **14.2%** of persons in Miami-Dade County live in poverty, higher than the overall state average of 12.1%.

Among all people living in poverty in the county, **4,844** people with HIV who are Ryan White Part A/MAI clients (**51.2%**) were living **below 130%** of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) in CY 2025.

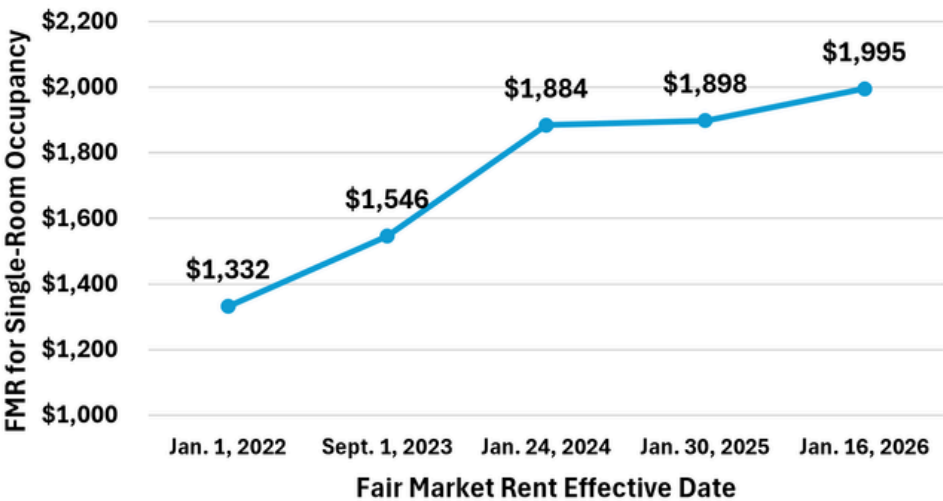
People who are Homeless or Unstably Housed

In CY 2025, **661** Ryan White Part A/MAI Program clients in care (**7.0%**) were unstably housed or experienced homelessness. These clients also had the lowest viral load suppression rate (**84%**) of any client group, and the highest annual treatment cost per client (**\$4,357**).

The lack of affordable housing and rising Fair Market Rents (FMR) continue to hinder treatment adherence and threaten positive health outcomes.

Groups Experiencing Higher HIV Impact

People Experiencing Food Insecurity

In 2023, An estimated **15.1%** of people in Miami-Dade County experienced food insecurity. The impact was highest among Black/African Americans, among whom **28%** experienced food insecurity.

In Fiscal Year 2025, the Ryan White Program Part A food bank helped more than **820** Ryan White Program clients experiencing food insecurity at a cost of more than **\$1.49 million**.

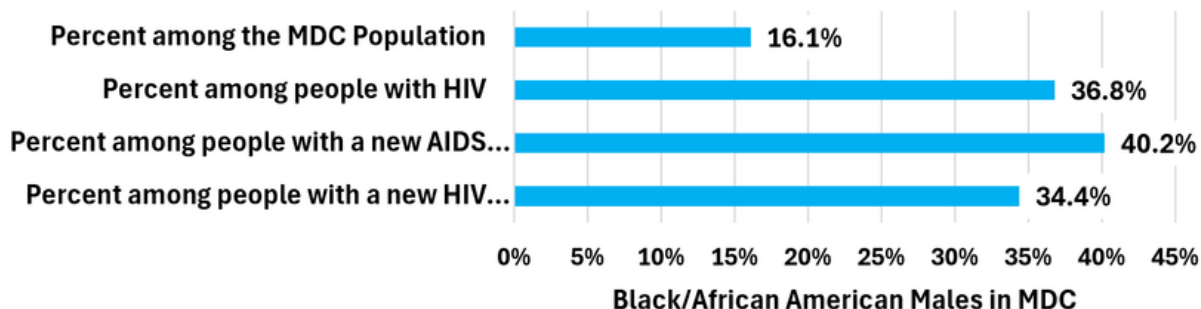

Black/African American Males

The incidence and prevalence of HIV among Black/African American males are much higher than the HIV population as a whole.

Black/African American male Ryan White Program clients also experience some of the lowest rates of retention in medical care and viral suppression - two key indicators for measuring positive health outcomes.

Co-occurring conditions present additional health challenges. Among the **1,170** Black/African American males served by the Ryan White Program in FY 2025:

- 64% lived below 136% of the Federal Poverty Level.
- 48% had no health insurance.
- 30% had a sexually transmitted infection (syphilis, gonorrhea, or chlamydia).
- 26% had an AIDS diagnosis during their lifetime.
- 17% were unstably housed.

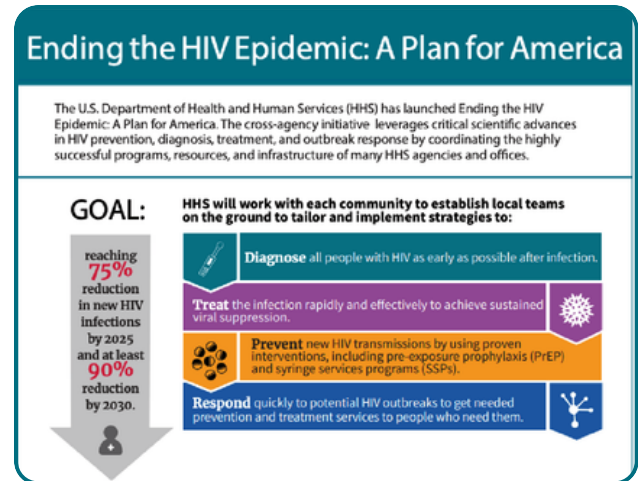

Key Community Partners

- The Miami-Dade HIV/AIDS Partnership, the official County Advisory Board for HIV needs and services in Miami-Dade County. The Partnership provides coordination among people with HIV, The Ryan White Part A/Minority AIDS Initiative (MAI) Program, service providers and administrators, Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County, government officials, the Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS Program (HOPWA), General Revenue, Medicaid, universities, hospitals, and HIV advocates.
- Miami-Dade County Office of Management and Budget Grants Coordination (OMB), the Ryan White Program Part A/MAI grant Recipient. The Recipient provides life-saving HIV medical care and treatment and support services to **more than 9,200 people with HIV** in FY 2025.
- The Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County (FDOH-MDC), the local county health department. FDOH-MDC provides HIV and sexually transmitted disease testing and prevention services, administering **more than 62,000 HIV tests** in CY 2025.
- The AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP), the federal and state-funded initiative that provides life-saving HIV medications for low-income, uninsured, or underinsured individuals living with HIV.
- People with HIV, including Ryan White Program clients.
- Peer educators/navigators and other direct service providers.
- Prevention providers and client advocacy groups.
- Other locally funded providers and community advocates.

Miami-Dade County Response

Ending the HIV Epidemic

Miami-Dade County is one of 57 Ending the HIV Epidemic (EHE) priority jurisdictions receiving funding for resources, technology, and expertise to expand HIV prevention, treatment, and support services.

All residents with HIV can benefit from these services.

Ryan White Program EHE Initiatives

Quick Connect Services

- Provides simplified HIV educational materials to non-Ryan White Program funded clinics and testing sites to promote services for people newly diagnosed with HIV and those returning to care.
- Expands across hospitals, clinics, and community settings to ensure rapid access to anti-retroviral therapy and linkage to ongoing care.

HealthTec Services

- Provides access to telecommunication devices (smart phones or tablets) and internet services, with basic instructions and connectivity support, to help people with HIV overcome barriers to care and engage in HIV telehealth services.

Housing Stability Services

- Provides housing stability services, including short-term, transitional, emergency, and supportive housing assistance, along with housing navigation and supportive case management services, to help people with HIV remain in HIV care and overcome housing-related barriers.

Mobile GO Teams Services

- Deploys Mobile GO Teams services using a mobile clinic to deliver healthcare services and provide access to ARV in high priority and underserved areas, reducing barriers to HIV care engagement and supporting improved health outcomes for people with HIV.

FDOH-MDC EHE Initiatives

HIV Testing

- Provides rapid HIV testing, routine HIV testing in emergency departments, and at-home HIV testing.

Rapid Access to Care

- Ensures all persons who test positive for HIV will have medication to reach viral load suppression.

Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP)

- Increases PrEP uptake and access points.

Re-engagement in Care

- Gets people who have fallen out of care back into care.

Partner Services

- Provides confidential partners services to individuals exposed to HIV, including HIV testing, and linkage to HIV treatment or PrEP.

Academic Detailing

- Educates hospitals and clinics on the benefits of routinized opt-out HIV testing.

Establishing a Referral Network

- Connects people with HIV to care and services.

Miami-Dade County Response

HIV Innovations and Interventions

Infectious Disease Elimination Act (IDEA)



2,438 people were enrolled at IDEA Miami as of 2024.

HIV transmission via injection drug use was mitigated by the IDEA Exchange, an innovative Syringe Services Program which started in December 2016 in Miami-Dade County, and has become a statewide Syringe Services Program model.

Results of the IDEA Miami innovation since 2016

- Conducted **38,162** client syringe exchange visits.
- Collected **2,021,573** used syringes at client syringe exchange visits
- Collected **17,212** more syringes than were distributed.
- Tested **1,818** people for HIV and identified **151 (8.3%)** people as HIV positive.
- Tested **1,726** people for hepatitis C virus (HCV) and identified **614 (35.6%)** people as HCV positive.

Frontlines of Communities in the United States (FOCUS)

The FOCUS Program continues to be a critical partner with the Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County, in promoting HIV testing in health care settings, including routine opt-out HIV screenings in outpatient clinics, emergency departments and urgent care centers.

Since CY 2021, the FOCUS Program has tested more than **830,000** people for HIV, including **213,800** HIV tests in CY 2025.

U=U: Undetectable = Untransmittable

U=U means that a person with HIV who is in treatment and maintains an undetectable viral load cannot transmit HIV to a sexual partner.

The Miami-Dade HIV/AIDS Partnership is among **more than 1,050 supporters** from 105 countries who have signed on to share the U=U message.



Miami-Dade County Response

HIV Prevention

By the latest CDC estimate, in 2022, there were **2,412 people in Miami-Dade County who have HIV and are not aware of their status**. The Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County (FDOH-MDC) implements a broad range of evidence-based HIV prevention strategies to identify people who are HIV positive and rapidly link them to care.

FDOH-MDC HIV Prevention Strategies

- HIV/STI Testing
 - In CY 2025, FDOH-MDC conducted **62,319** HIV tests.
 - In CY 2025, the FOCUS Program conducted **213,800** HIV tests.
- Priority HIV Testing in High-Incidence Neighborhoods
 - HIV testing, community outreach, and culturally tailored education.
- Test and Treat/Rapid Access (TTRA)
 - For persons who test positive, TTRA ensures same-day access to medical care and antiretroviral therapy medication, and rapid linkage to ongoing care.
- PrEP and PEP
 - PrEP: Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis. A person who tests negative for HIV is offered PrEP as a comprehensive HIV prevention method.
 - PEP: Post-Exposure Prophylaxis. Use of medication to prevent HIV within 72 hours of potential exposure.
- Free Condoms
 - In CY 2025, FDOH-MDC distributed **862,079** free condoms with the help of a broad variety of community partners, including bars and clubs, colleges and schools, faith-based organizations, and street outreach.
- Social Media and Web-Based Resources

Successful Outcomes

The Ryan White Program

Miami-Dade County's Ryan White Part A/Minority AIDS Initiative (Part A/MAI) Program continues to maintain clients in care and keep them virally suppressed.

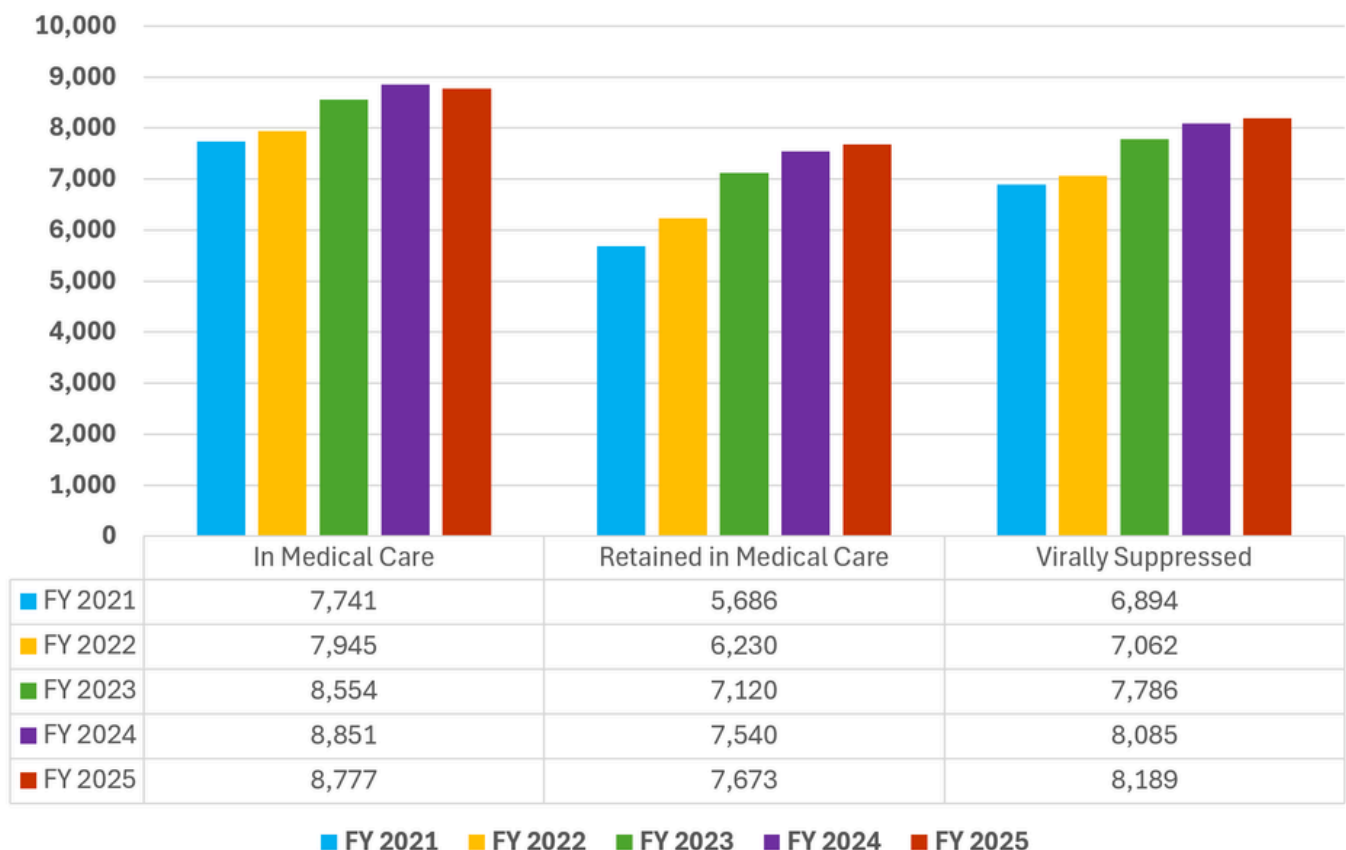
The key measurement of program success is the HIV Care Continuum. Data are monitored on a monthly basis and quality improvement initiatives are developed as needed to ensure positive health outcomes.

HIV Care Continuum Criteria

- In Medical Care: At least one medical visit, a CD4 test, or viral load test in a 12 month period.
- Retained In Medical Care: Two or more medical visits or viral load tests, at least 90 days apart in a 12 month period.
- Viral suppression is based on data for people with HIV who had at least one outpatient ambulatory health services visit and at least one viral load test during the measurement year and whose most recent viral load test result was less than 200 copies/mL.

Successful Outcomes

Test and Treat/Rapid Access

The Florida Department of Health in Miami-Dade County and the Ryan White Program Part A/MAI rapid start protocol, referred to as Test and Treat/Rapid Access (TTRA), is the basis for same-day access to medical care, antiretroviral therapy medication, and rapid linkage to ongoing care.

For people who receive a positive HIV test result, the TTRA process is proficient in connecting them to care, including providing a referral and warm hand-off for mental health, substance use, and medical care appointments.

For people who receive a negative HIV test result, PrEP services are available.

The protocol has demonstrated success in linking newly diagnosed persons to care, with a linkage rate of **83%** in 2024.

Perinatal Transmission

Perinatal, maternal, and infant health continues to be a focus of prevention and care and treatment efforts, with a target of maintaining the national goals of perinatal HIV incidence of <1 per 100,000 live births and a perinatal transmission rate of <1 %.

2025 marks the seventh year in a row that **NO BABIES WERE BORN WITH HIV** to mothers with HIV in Miami-Dade County.

Targeted Outreach for Pregnant Women Act (TOPWA)

The Targeted Outreach for Pregnant Women Act (TOPWA) is a Florida health program created in 1999 to connects vulnerable, HIV-positive, or substance-using pregnant women not receiving adequate care to vital prenatal, medical, and social services to prevent infant transmission. In addition to accessing prenatal care, women enrolled in TOPWA can receive assistance with HIV testing, family planning services, enrollment in ADAP or Medicaid, and HIV prevention and education.

In Miami-Dade County, TOPWA services are coordinated through Borinquen Medical Centers.



Successful Outcomes

Miami-Dade HIV/AIDS Partnership

The Partnership is the Ryan White Program Planning Council established by County Ordinance as the official County Advisory Board for HIV needs and services in Miami-Dade County. Members are responsible for prioritizing services and allocating Ryan White Program funds which totalled more than **\$29 million** in FY 2025.



The Partnership is a community of people with HIV and people who care about people with HIV.

Partnership members are Ryan White Program clients, people with HIV, peer educators, service providers, medical case managers, doctors, pharmacists, government representatives, and more!

Our vision is to eliminate barriers and disparities, improve health outcomes, and create a healthier, empowered Miami-Dade County for all people living with, impacted by, or vulnerable to HIV.

The Partnership has Ex-Officio representative seats for a Representative from the Office of the Mayor, Representative from the Board of County Commissioners, and Representative from Miami-Dade County Public Schools.

Membership is open to anyone who is a permanent resident and registered voter in Miami-Dade County.

All Partnership activities are open to the public.

Challenges and Impacts

Planning for the Future

The Partnership and community partners are closely monitoring proposed local, state and federal program changes and budget cuts for contingency planning to minimize negative impacts on health outcomes for people with HIV.

Cuts to HIV funding and elimination of programs threaten to set us back to the epidemic crisis levels of 40 years ago.

Ryan White Program Funding Cuts

- Loss of Ryan White Program funds means a reduction in basic lifesaving medical services for low-income people with HIV.

AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP) Funding Cuts

- Loss of ADAP funds for Affordable Care Act insurance premiums means Ryan White funds - already strained by cuts to that program - must now absorb additional costs for outpatient medical care for clients who have lost their insurance.

Prevention Funding Cuts

- Loss of funds for prevention services means more people lost to HIV care will remain out of care, and more people with HIV will go undiagnosed and can increase HIV transmission rates.

Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) Funding Cuts

- HOPWA funding cuts means hundreds of low-income people with HIV will be evicted from their homes and will be unable to maintain stable housing.



In this climate of funding cuts across all sectors of HIV prevention and care . . .

- **What can we do** to address the needs of people aging with HIV? Older people with HIV experience social isolation, chronic conditions, treatment fatigue, mobility limitations, and increased healthcare and insurance costs.
- **What can we do** to reduce HIV and STI transmission and improve sexual health knowledge among young people? School-aged youth lack comprehensive sexual health education and Miami-Dade County has limited opportunities to provide age-appropriate sexual health information, HIV prevention education, and HIV/STI testing in school settings.
- **What can we do** to reduce the stigma and misinformation that still surrounds HIV transmission and treatment?

We urge you to support continued and increased funding for the Ryan White Program, ADAP, HOPWA, and HIV high impact prevention.

Support People with HIV.

- **Listen.** Being diagnosed with HIV is life-changing news. Be available to have open, honest conversations about HIV. Follow the lead of the person who is diagnosed with HIV. They may not want to talk about their diagnosis or may not be ready. They may want to connect with you in the same ways they did before they were diagnosed. Do things you did together before their diagnosis; talk about things you talked about before their diagnosis. Show them that you see them as the same person and that they are more than their diagnosis.
- **Learn.** Educate yourself about HIV - what it is, how it is and is not transmitted, how it is treated, and how people can stay healthy with HIV. Having a solid understanding of HIV is a big step forward in supporting people with HIV.

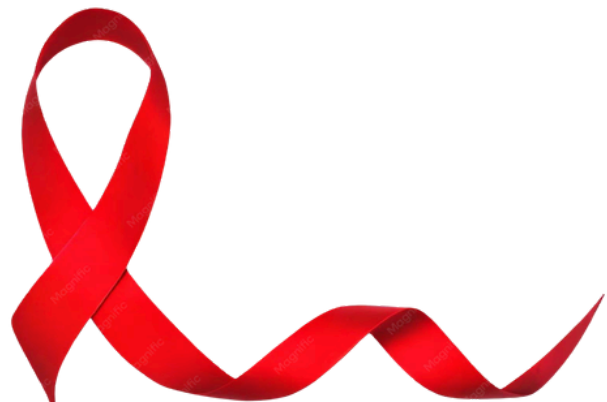
